It seems that we are not lacking opinions or predictions on how long this pandemic may last or what a NEW normal will really look like? We are awaiting pool guidance from the county and local health officials to determine when we may be able to open for the community and the swim team, and what requirements may be for our Fun Run and Parade July 4th. Tennis Club to Build CERT Storage Building

In thrilling news from President Chris Staskus (see article on page 6 for more information), the Sleepy Hollow Tennis Club members are committed to build the CERT storage building, with the leadership of Reinhard Ludke. This could allow the CERT storage to be completed as part of Phase 1, and full use of the renovated space in the building including the Flex Room for activities.

New Sleepy Hollow Community Center Is Coming Alive

We are working out an agreement with Schalich Brothers Construction for Phase 1 of the project to begin as soon as our building permit is processed. If started by July 1, the schedule puts us in the new Center in March 2021. Our faithful, tired old building will be turned into a beautiful new space for community gatherings, new activities, and home of the SHFPD. Early permitted work (e.g. sewer laterals) and interior work not requiring a permit are underway now. Pool access corridor and asbestos removal were completed in February.

Phasing 1 and 2 Phasing is possible because during the recent pause in most activity, SHCF, with SHHA, architect Fairchild Broms Design, contractor Schalich Brothers, and Construction Team Dave Grubb, Steve Knox, Luke Argilla, Jan Blackford, and Scott Hintergardt, have worked out how to:

- Complete renovation of the main

Enjoying the Outdoors During COVID

As we head into warm summer days and plan for spending time outdoors, please remember your face coverings, be diligent about social distancing, and make sure you are familiar with the May 18 Public Health Order as it pertains to access and recreation in Marin County parks and open spaces.

The May 18 Order gives parks and open space agencies the authority to open, limit, or prohibit motorized access as needed to prevent overcrowding, for public health and safety. Marin's thousands of acres of public lands are under the jurisdiction of several different agencies – federal, state, county, cities, towns, and special districts. Some locations continue enforcing parking restrictions. Remember to check the status of any location before heading out – espe-

cially popular destinations and coastal areas. Marin County Parks has created an online location list, which provides the status of county parks and open space preserves as well as links to other parks and recreation destinations. To read the order, visit <https://coronavirus.marinhhs.org/>.

Keeping Marin COVID-Resilient

Though we've been very successful in "flattening the curve," the COVID-19 virus remains active and still very much in our community. The real test is coming as we begin opening up our economy and slow-

ing returning to more normal patterns of life. With increased testing capacity and matching contact tracing capability, our public health team is well armed to identify outbreaks and contain spread of the virus. However, the most critical variable in our ability to control COVID-19 is our own individual behavior. It remains essential that we continue to stay home as much as possible, practice social distancing, cover our face in public settings, wash or sanitize our hands often. Until we have a vaccine these behaviors must become "the norm" in order get as close to "normal" as possible and sustain a coronavirus-resilient community. Do You Know Where Your Pool Water Goes When It Leaves Home?

Follow best management practices for swimming pool, spa or fountain water to help keep pollutants out of our waterways, protect water in our creeks and comply with local, state, and federal laws. It's illegal to discharge water from pools, spas and fountains – including filter rinse water and backwash – to streets, storm drains or creeks! And remember that we as homeowners are responsible for making sure pool services follow all discharge requirements.

In Marin County, all storm drains flow directly to creeks and other waterways with no treatment. Many chemicals used in pool maintenance (e.g. chlorine, bromine, copper, silver) are extremely toxic to aquatic life. Discharge can cause pooling that breeds disease bearing mosquitos, or flooding that disrupts mosquito abatement or causes erosion.

ter coordinator at 415-473-3748 with any questions. For any assistance with mosquito problems and other pests, visit www.msosquito.org.

Please take note of the following:

- Saltwater pools cannot be discharged to a sanitary sewer system or a storm drain!

The preferred method is to discharge pool, spa, or fountain water (other than salt water) onto land surfaces provided the water is dechlorinated/debrominated, the pH is between 6.5 and 8.5, and the land area is sufficient to prevent erosion and runoff into a ditch, creek, or other stormwater conveyance.

- If landscaping is not a viable option, the next best choice is to discharge pool, spa, or fountain water to the sanitary system. Contact your local sanitary sewer agency to make sure the discharge will not create a problem in the sewer system or wastewater treatment plant downstream of your property

As a last resort, discharge to a storm drain only if:

- no other disposal methods (e.g. sanitary sewer, landscaping) are possible.
- the pool, spa, or fountain water is completely dechlorinated/debrominated.

- concentrations of copper and silver are not harmful to fish or other aquatic life.
- the pH is between 6.5 and 8.5.
- the water is free of any unusual coloration, dirt, suds, or algae.
- there is no discharge of filter media.
- there is no discharge of acid cleaning wastes.
- the water is at ambient temperature. (Heated water should be allowed to cool.)

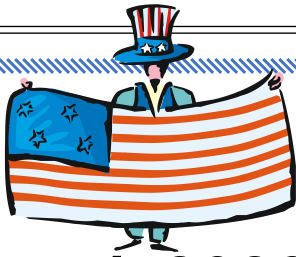

building now, as Phase 1, with cash available.

- Continue with Phase 2 when additional fundraising is more feasible.
- Modify construction plans for an overall lower project cost.

Phase 1 is our multi-purpose community center with new roof, electrical, plumbing, HVAC, windows, doors, improved site drainage, new sewer lateral, and drive-through o Butterfield. e layout includes all the large gathering space we have now, separable into Founders Room and Legends Pavilion for smaller

events or simultaneous activities. Sleepy Hollow Fire Protection District will have its office and storage space and access to meeting and training space. There is a new kitchen, enclosed porch/library, new bathroom directly accessible from the Founders Room, and flex room, all on one floor. Phase 1 budget is \$1.7M, including cash on hand, a portion of agreed private lending, and gifts in fulfillment of Round 2 pledges made in 2018 and 2019. Donated professional services and owner managed construction allow us to complete the main building in spite of the burden the Phase 1 budget carries for all engineering, infrastructure, and code requirements of the entire project. Dave Grubb and Steve Knox will lead management of finish work such as tiling, interior trim and casework, and painting, within the \$1.7M budget.

Phase 2 will renovate bathrooms, install outdoor showers, as well as the play/ fitness area, covered outdoor dining, outdoor replace, courtyard paving, and additional landscaping, With new fundraising and volunteer support, the sooner the Community Center will be fully transformed. Watch for news of further milestones, award of the permits and official start date, and opportunities to see details and learn more online and on the ground when possible.

5/7/2020**

The May meeting of the Sleepy Hollow Homes Association Board was called to order by Board president Scott Hintergardt at 7:00 p.m. with Jan Blackford, Spencer Adams, Lauren Thornhill, Matt Testa, Hayley Mullens, Dave Baker, and Pete Mayer present by Zoom.

Homes Association membership continues to lag behind last year's pace, likely due to general uncertainty regarding household finances and whether the pool will be able to open for recreational swimming. It is the Board's hope and expectation that pools will be included in Marin County's third phase of reopening and we will stay in touch as soon as this is confirmed. In the meantime, reminder fliers organized by Hayley Mullen and Spencer Adams were delivered the mail boxes of lapsed members and new residents, and response has been encouraging. Former Board president Sharon Adams and current member Ann Wagner are supporting Spencer an Hayley in efforts to drive membership renewal.

The Board also discussed the unfortunate possibility of whether pool opening will be

possible at all given the membership renewal lag and uncertainty about revenues, refunds, and operating restrictions and costs. Certain costs such as lifeguards, maintenance, and heating are fixed regardless of membership size, and at some point lack of membership fees will make it impossible to cover our costs. We are looking at various possible scenarios so we can respond quickly when health guidance for community pools is more clear.

Jan Blackford placed into nomination Gina Singleton as a board member. Lauren Thornhill seconded the nomination and the Board voted unanimously in Gina's nomination. Gina will fill the twelfth seat on the Board and take be involved in several initiatives, new and continuing, including the Safe Streets program, and will serve as Recording Secretary, coordinating with Pete who is Corporate Secretary.

The Board discussed some alternative models for how to safely proceed with our great Fourth of July tradition. While it does not seem likely that a gathering of the typical scale can be carried out safely, or will even be permissible under County guidelines, certain of the usual festivities will probably be feasible such as the parade and fun run. We will announce that intent and tailor the actual events to requirements at that time and to community interest.

MMWD: Business Continues at the Water District

Despite COVID-19, the water district is conducting business. With safety procedures firmly in place, the offices remain closed and 50 percent of the employees are working from home. However, the watershed remains open, with restrictions established for safety. Watershed parking is prohibited, except for visitors with disability placards who can park at Sky Oaks. Water board meetings continue to be conducted as scheduled. Meetings are held remotely and the public can participate via the district's livestreaming found on the MMWD website. Public questions and comments can be submitted by email to boardcomment@marinwater.org.

New Water System Master Plan to Be Developed

Nevertheless, much of the district's familiar work continues uninterrupted. At a recent meeting, the board authorized the development of a Water System Master Plan (WSMP). It was in 1975 that the district last completed a Water Master Plan. The overall purpose of the plan is to conduct a comprehensive evaluation of the water system to determine facility needs, to implement the schedule for maintaining water system reliability, and to enhance its long-term operation. Approximately 50 percent of the district's 900-mile pipeline distribution system consists of pipes that are over 50 years old and over 300 miles comprise cast iron pipes requiring continued maintenance. The average age of the district's 124 storage tanks is 38



years and over 40 storage tanks are more than 50 years old.

The WSMP, in conjunction with the district's Long-Range Capital Program (1990), and the Fire Flow Improvement Program (2012) as well as other planning tools, will help the district more keenly set goals for asset replacement and repair, and generally help prioritize

those decisions.

Decreasing Greenhouse Gas Emissions

The district will be participating in a pilot Demand Response Program through an energy aggregator, Voltus, Inc. (Voltus). Voltus assembles a portfolio of customers, and provides a bid to PG&E for how much electricity demand Voltus can remove from the grid during certain times of the month. Over a three-month period, by managing the timing of the district's power use in coordination with Voltus, the district will reduce power usage for a maximum of two hours, one day of each month at three of our facilities — the North Marin Boosters, Ignacio Pump Station and Tocaloma Pump Station. That coordination decreases greenhouse gas emissions and helps reduce the district's carbon footprint. District engineers indicate that there is no difficulty in complying with managing that power use. However, if for some reason the district is not able to comply and continues pumping at these sites, there is no penalty.

This is all usual business at the water district— with or without the Coronavirus.

access this spring. Stay healthy and we look forward to seeing our members and friends back on the courts soon.

CERT Storage Building to Be Donated and Built by the SHTC members.

The January 2020 SHHA Newsletter article, "Renovation Countdown Sharpens," indicated the SHFPD CERT storage building construction would have to be deferred due to construction fund limits.

The SHTC is pleased to announce that Sleepy Hollow Tennis Club Board Member and Treasurer, Reinhard Ludke, S.E., has volunteered to be the CERT Building Construction Manager and furnish the necessary materials and labor to construct the CERT storage building.

Some SHTC members have also volunteered to help Reinhard with the grading, foundation, framing, electric power and finish construction. Reinhard met with Jessica Fairchild, Architect and Jan Blackford, SHHA past President in March to review the CERT Plans and received the current SHFPD storage requirements from Rich Shorthall, SHFPD President. Con-

struction will commence when SHHA proceeds with the Community Center renovation construction.
